A decline in basic food, health, and educational services has also affected most of the population, especially in rural and remote areas, as well as the suffering of the most vulnerable groups, including the displaced and those affected by the current situation due to the escalation of poverty and hunger and continued decline of the country's economy and living standards.

With the objective of meeting the broad humanitarian needs of the year 2022, the For Human Foundation for Development (FHD) supported and implemented a wide range of programs, projects, services, and humanitarian initiatives, including (food security, shelter and protection, economic empowerment, health and education, water and environmental sanitation).








# A map of FHD's interventions in 2022

# **About the project**

Food security situation in Yemen is one of the worst globally, according to reports issued by United Nations organizations. Since humanitarian aid is unstable and the economic crisis is worsening daily, the statistics are expected to increase.

As part of its efforts to limit the exacerbation of the food crisis, FHD has been implementing several project-related to food security throughout the year in cooperation with international, regional and local organizations.

# Integrated project for relief of the displaced

To alleviate the suffering of poor and needy families, 672 integrated food baskets were distributed to cover their basic needs. The following foodstuffs were distributed: (25 kg of flour, 10 kg of sugar, 10 kg of rice, 1.5 liters of oil, 3 kg of dates, a carton of sauce, and 12 boxes of legumes).

The project's goal is to alleviate the suffering of displaced and poor families affected by the conflicts during the holy month of Ramadan. 215 families benefited from the project through the distribution of integrated food baskets consisting of (25 kilos of flour, 10 kilos of sugar, 10 kilos of basmati rice, 1.5 liters of vegetable oil, 24 cans of red beans, 24 grains of sauce 70 grams, 3 kilos of dates, and 1 kilo of powdered milk).

# Protection Enhancement Project - Seiyun

The project's objective is to improve human rights-based protection interventions by accessing primary income generation alternatives and improving the life skills of women and girls. This has resulted in training many girls and women in sewing, embroidery, and incense making, as well as helping them learn how to market their products.

As part of the project, International Volunteer Day, International AIDS Day, and International Human Rights Day were also celebrated within a campaign to stop violence against women.

#### 1 2023 - 2022 Winter below zero clothing project

A key objective of the project is to assist the displaced, the poor, the needy, widows and orphans who have been displaced due to the severe cold in the region and the displacement of people to it, which includes many humanitarian camps, in order to reduce the harshness of winter and prevent the spread of diseases.

The project provided supplies for protection from the cold for families, such as blankets and winter clothes for each beneficiary family, as follows: (2 blankets + 2 sponge mattresses + 1 women's wool undershirt + 2 boys

The following materials were delivered: (soap powder 2.5 kg, 1 shower gel shampoo 400 ml, a small towel, 2 hair combs, 3 packets of feminine tampons).

WATER AND ENVIRONMENTAL SANITATION



#### **About the project**

Yemen suffers from the largest humanitarian crisis in the world, as Yemenis face multiple crises, including armed conflict, displacement, the threat of famine, and the spread of diseases that have caused the worst man-made humanitarian crisis. About 75% of the population (22.22 million) need humanitarian assistance, including 3.11 million people who are in urgent need of emergency assistance to survive, an increase of one million people since June 2017.

Due to its significance, For Human Development Foundation (FHD) has dedicated its efforts to saving people's lives by providing them with the minimum amount of potable water and mitigating the spread of infectious diseases, such as cholera, schistosomiasis and other diseases related to water quality or quantity, which leads to an increase in the number of acute malnutrition cases resulting from drinking contaminated water.

FHD also facilitated the access of the displaced and poor families to the minimum amount of potable water at the distribution points in the targeted camps and villages.

### A project to provide integrated and life-saving response

The project contributed to improving the conditions of the displaced and host communities, and reducing their risk of contracting diseases related to water, sanitation and malnutrition, in the areas of (Al Sabaa Al Ulya, Al Sabaa Al Sufla, and Al Akash) in Hays district of Hodeidah Governorate.

In order to achieve these outcomes, the target communities were provided with improved water and sanitation facilities and hygiene kits, along with awareness and knowledge that could help improve water and sanitation practices.

### A project to provide clean drinking water for IDP camps

The project supplied clean water to about 752 displaced families and host community by trucking water to the distribution points. A major benefit of the project was that it secured the stability of families from migration to other regions, resulting from the scarcity of water, thereby alleviating the suffering of the displaced and inhabitants, as well as reducing the effort and cost of obtaining clean water for them.

#### **Um Ahmed's success story**

For a long time, Um Ahmed dreamed of having an income-generating project. Based on this ardent desire, she went to several workshops close to her home to work for them in the hope that she would be trained and developed, but nothing of that was achieved.

After discovering she was interested in sewing, one of her friends suggested she take a sewing course with For Human Development Foundation (FHD), telling her that FHD would train her until she becomes a professional.

Um Ahmed did not hesitate, so she joined the program directly and was accepted. She learned many skills that she was not aware of in the past. She did not know what life skills are, what marketing is, and how the budget is managed.

She was previously afraid of cutting expensive fabrics as she could not afford it, and she had no knowledge of measurements. However, following her joining FHD, she completed several training courses and specialized in embroidery for wedding dresses.

Her self-confidence increased as a result, and she developed her own project at home, which improved the financial situation of her family and herself.



#### Sawsan's success story

Since her childhood, Sawsan was distinguished by her love for sewing, and she says, "I have always been impressed when I see models on mobile phones or TV. I wish I could make similar pieces, and I dream of having my own factory to produce clothes."

Sawsan returned to Hadhramaut after having been out of the country for over twenty years. She was unable to complete her secondary education due to her father>s financial situation.

Sawsan says, «I used to go to my neighbor who is a seamstress and watch her as she sews and cuts, and she refuses to help her or teach me, but I always go to her to watch her only.»

And when Sawsan and her family had to return to Yemen, they found the conditions bad. Their situation continued to get worse until she looked for courses to develop herself and learn what she dreamed of and wished of being able to do.

Sawsan says, «For Human Development Foundation (FHD) gave me the first step in realizing my dream.» When the opportunity arose for Sawsan, she joined the sewing training course conducted by FHD for a period of 3 months. During the training, she also loved helping others and explaining to her fellow trainees. She was greatly distinguished as she worked on producing creative works in the sewing course.

A year after Sawsan graduated, she was requested to train at the FHD after seeing her outputs, creativity, style, and ability to deliver information. Her method of conveying information in the desired manner was greatly appreciated by the trainees when she began the training.

Sawsan says that her family did not believe that their daughter was sewing, training, and financially participating greatly in meeting their needs, as they became dependent on her and very proud of her. And since she had long dreamed of establishing her own factory to produce dresses and clothes, this project is considered one of the basic seeds for its formation.













#### **Success story of M.D.K**

Displaced from Al-Jarrahi district, M.D.K lives in the district of Hays, Hodeidah governorate. She had three children, one of whom died due to illness, and she had two children left to support. Her father and husband used to sell firewood to support her and her family, but because of the war, her father died, and her husband was mentally ill and lost his mind, in addition to the burning of their entire house.

M.D.K. says, "I had to work in the same profession (collecting firewood) to provide a living for myself and my children. However, I am still in this situation because my life is hard and I still live in a yard that has no roof and no livable shelter".

"This life has caused my children to contract many diseases. Sometimes, neither I nor my children can find food to satisfy our hunger, and I have no parents, brothers or sisters who provide support, aid and assistance to me".

She also says, "until a team from FHD came to know me and assess my case, so they offered me to receive training with them in sewing and embroidery courses. They explained to me that this course would help me support myself and my family".

"I agreed to register, and when I finished all the stages of the training, I was given a grant from the International Islamic Charity Organization, which is a sewing machine with all its accessories.

Now, thanks to God, I started working on the sewing profession, and I have an income that supports me and my family. I also aspire to expand my business further in the near future".









#### **Success Story of S.M.K**

She lives in Al-Khawkhah district, Hodeidah governorate, displaced from the city of Sa'ada, which was a conflict zone. She lives with her family of 9 members, her mother, children, brother and sister.

S.M.K. says: I was living in a good condition before the displacement, as I had a shelter and food to satisfy my hunger and the members of my family. However, after the war, we had to flee our city and leave everything we owned behind.

S.M.K. also says: I settled in Al-Khawkhah city, but my condition was getting worse from day to day, and the neighbors knew my difficult condition. One day, my neighbor advised me to register for the training courses offered by the safe space in the district, so I went to register for one of the courses. Shortly after, a team from the safe space came to my house to identify my needs for this course and also to assess my living conditions in general.

I was selected to enter this course. At first, I did not know anything about raising livestock, how to treat them, and take care of their health and birth. However, after completing the course, I acquired many skills that were lacking on how to take care of livestock in all aspects. In addition, we were given a course on life skills that encouraged us on how to market our projects and how to develop them.

After completing the course, I was given a grant from the International Islamic Charity Organization, which helped me provide for myself and my family. Now my ambition is to take more care of livestock and to work on opening my own project in this field because it has gradually changed my life for the better.
